The Tatong Recreation Reserve Community Hub has recently been designated as a Neighbourhood Safer Place (NSP) - Bushfire Place of Last Resort.



The NSP is located at the Hub building itself rather than the reserve and it is intended to be used as a place of last resort only. An NSP is not a fire refuge or shelter and doesn't replace the need to have a Bushfire Survival Plan. Council has worked with the CFA to identify and designate this new NSP in recognition of the significant fire danger that exists for residents and visitors to Tatong and surrounds. *CFA advises that everyone should have a written Bushfire Survival Plan.*

Neighbourhood Safer Places are municipal council designated buildings or spaces within the community that may afford some protection from radiant heat, the biggest killer during bushfire. They are a place of last resort in bushfire emergencies only. They are a last resort shelter that may assist people when there is imminent threat of bushfire and they have no plan, or their planned options are not possible.

They are not locations to relocate to when leaving early. On days when there is advice to leave early people should relocate well away to an area of lower risk either the night before or early in the morning. The degree of safety afforded by Neighbourhood Safer Places will depend on a number of factors, including the intensity of the bushfire.

Please be aware of the following risks associated with Neighbourhood Safer Places:

• Travelling to a Neighbourhood Safer Place is inherently dangerous with traffic congestion, poor visibility, fire activity, heavy smoke and accidents or fallen trees that may block the route there.

• There is no guarantee that you will not be mentally traumatised, injured or killed when travelling to or sheltering at a Neighbourhood Safer Place.

• You are likely to experience extreme conditions such as; heat, high winds, fire noise, embers, radiant heat, smoke and ash sheltering at a Neighbourhood Safer Place.

• There is no guarantee that emergency services will be present.

• There will be no provision for pets.

• There will generally be limited parking. Large numbers of vehicles may further compromise what little protection the area affords.

• There will be limited capacity. No amenities (eg. food, drinks, toilets) will be provided.

• Neighbourhood Safer Places will not exist in all communities. In some instances there may not be a Neighbourhood Safer Place identified in your local area or close to your home.



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

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

Murphy's (and others') Laws

The twentieth of each month is the deadline for submissions to the Tattler. Therefore this means that from publication and delivery to the next submission date is about three weeks. That should be plenty of time to prepare one's next item. Usually the reality is that the eighteenth and nineteenth of each month see some (often frantic) head scratching wondering what to write about.

There is a 'law' that covers this type of thing – **Edward's law of time and effort**. It says that time and effort are inversely proportional to each other – *The more time available to complete a task, the less the effort applied. As time decreases, effort increases. If it wasn't for the last minute, nothing would get done.*

Pareto's principle, or the 80 / 20 rule, is something that applies to many things in everyday life. It states that 80% of a job is done in 20% of the time taken and the last (fiddly) 20% of the job takes the remaining 80%. It also points out that often 80% of the work is done by 20% of the people.

Everyone refers to Murphy's Law, and there are many variations on the same theme - here are some thoughts.

Murphy's Original Law If there are two or more ways to do something, and one of those ways can result in a catastrophe, then someone will do it.

Murphy's Law If anything can go wrong -- it will.

Murphy's First Corollary Left to themselves, things tend to go from bad to worse.

Murphy's Second Corollary It is impossible to make anything foolproof because fools are so ingenious.

Quantised Revision of Murphy's Law Everything goes wrong all at once.

Murphy's Constant Matter will be damaged in direct proportion to its value.

The Murphy Philosophy Smile... tomorrow will be worse.

While **Murphy's Law** says that anything that can go wrong, will go wrong (eventually), **Sod's Law** requires that it always go wrong with the worst possible outcome.

'Murphy' was possibly one Edward Murphy. From 1948 to 1949, at what is now Edwards Airforce Base, tests were carried out to test human tolerance to g forces during rapid deceleration. Edward Murphy set up the tests which used a rocket sled mounted on a railway track with a series of hydraulic brakes at the end. Airforce Captain Stapp 'volunteered' and was covered with sensors to measure the strain on his body. When he staggered off the rig after the test he was told that all the sensors read zero – they had all been attached back to front!

How Mr. Murphy died: One dark evening (in the U.S.), Mr. Murphy's car ran out of petrol. As he hitchhiked to a petrol station, facing traffic and wearing white, he was struck from behind by a British tourist who was driving on the wrong side of the road.

Some other 'laws':-

Lee's Law - It takes less time to do something right than it takes to explain why you did it wrong

Campbell's Law – the less you do, the less can go wrong

Irene's Law – there is no right way to do the wrong thing


Anthony's Law of Force: Don't force it; get a larger hammer.

As Summer Draws to a Close - We are all Remarking that this one was "Different"

At the last "Molyullah at the Tatong Dinner" the perennial question "How are your Tomatoes?" was asked. Most of us said "slow", as the cool start to the season held them back.

It was nice to get some "Garden Saving Rain" from time to time, and to have a green lawn is something of a novelty when - if you are like me - you don't water the grass. Tho I must say that since I "bit the bullet" and planted some Buffalo Grass, the annual "browning of the grass" is being phased out.

Beating the Calbage Moth

I was pleasantly surprised at the interest shown in last month's article on *Barbarea Vulgaris* and its ability to keep the cabbage moths away.

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The Importance of Potassium

Potassium (Potash) is a standard ingredient in most fertilisers. It is also available on its own in a crystalline form, which is dissolved in water, a granular, slow release form which is sprinkled directly around plants and is sometimes available in liquid form.

Along with nitrogen and phosphorous, potassium is a macro-nutrient - plants need a lot of it. Fertilisers have displayed on the back of the pack - 'N' for nitrogen, 'P' for phosphorous and 'K' - just to be confusing - that's Latin for kalium which stands for potassium. *It was first isolated from* potash - the ashes of plants, from which its name derives.

How does K for potash work?



Firstly, potassium helps plants to move water and sugar inside themselves, so it makes fruit juicier and sweeter and it also improves the quality of flowers.

Secondly, potassium helps strengthen plants - it thickens their cell walls. Potassium is an essential nutrient for crop growth, being fundamental to many plant processes that impact on crop yield, quality and plant health. For example if a general purpose fertiliser, containing nitrogen, was to be applied to spring onions it will produce a surge of growth, but the growth is soft and sappy and prone to rot. Applied on its own, potassium produces the same surge of growth, only that growth is strong and less susceptible to rot. Thirdly, potassium helps defend plants against disease. Just as humans produce antibodies after infection, plants also have a similar defence mechanism when infected by a pathogen. The potassium status of a plant is important for both the production and the transport of these compounds to the site of infection. Shortages reduce the amount of natural antifungal compounds, increasing the plant's susceptibility to disease, once it has penetrated the cells.

The infection causes increased production of certain chemicals that form part of the plant's defence mechanism. By creating thicker cell walls, potassium makes it difficult for germinating fungal spores to punch a hole through the side of the cell wall and cause disease.

The importance of balanced nutrition is clearly evident with potassium, due to its close interactions with nitrogen, both in uptake through the roots and utilisation within the plant. A shortage of potash will not only result in lower nitrogen use efficiency, but will also lead to greater drought susceptibility, increased lodging, (lodging is the displacement of stems or roots from their vertical and proper placement) a reduction in photosynthesis and restricted movement of water, nutrients and sugars around the plant.

Frost Tolerance - Potassium promotes a high concentration of sugars in cells. This increase in sugar content in cells helps to lower the sap's freezing point, acting as antifreeze agents, and resulting in improved frost tolerance. This is particularly helpful for potatoes.

Water balance and Drought Tolerance

Plants also rely on potassium to regulate the opening and closing of the Stoma - tiny apertures on leaves, which allow the movement of carbon dioxide into the plant, as well as the release of oxygen and the loss of water vapour.

The plant regulates this opening and closing through the movement of potassium into or out of the guard cells which surround them.

When water supply is short, the cells close the stomata to prevent water loss to the atmosphere. If potassium levels within the plant are low the stomata become slow to respond and they do not close as quickly, resulting in the loss of water vapour. As a result, plants with an insufficient potassium supply are more susceptible to drought.

Now, how much potassium to use? It varies according to the brand, so check the back of the pack and remember that a little bit goes a long way. **You can overdo**

potassium and you can kill plants.

That said, just for a few dollars, a kilo will do the whole of the garden for an entire year - fruit, vegetables, turf -

everything, so it as beneficial, as it is cheap. Use potassium and you'll get fresh flowers, strong plants and delicious fruit.

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


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Sabotage on the Farm

SOME OF 'THE KNOWLEDGE' ABOUT TATONG

Someone asked that the Tattler writers provide information about Tatong of a general nature so I'll pass on some from my, almost 20 years here. Prior to moving here we lived in Samaria for 8 years.

The block that we live on, next door to the Tavern, plus Champ's house on the corner was only occupied by houses for about the last 60 years. Originally the pub had gardens in the block next door and the others were empty, used for the annual Guy Fawkes bonfires. There was a butcher's shop behind Champ's place and a Police station and lockup in the third house from the crossroads heading for Moorngag.

At the 10k roadside post heading from the Tatong Township towards Tolmie is a track which leads down to a swimming hole in the river. There are rock pools there too and sometimes the water is almost warm, but mostly cold. The swimming hole has been formed because where the rocks stop, the water flow has gouged the river bed into a permanent hole. For people new to swimming in country pools and rivers, leeches can sometimes be found having dinner on your blood. Don't panic because you just have to add a pinch of salt to the leech's body and it will excuse itself and depart rapidly. So remember to take the salt! Not much further up Tatong-Tolmie Rd at a sharp bend in the road is a small plantation of exotic trees which were planted by the school teachers and students which stood just behind that site. The most famous is the beautiful example of a cork tree. This amazing tree's bark is make of cork. And to go even a little further and beside the river we have the Wrightly weather station which is sometimes referenced in TV weather reports.

I consider this road to the end of the bitumen at Ford's bridge to be a minor classic drive rivalling the Great Ocean Rd and other famous winding tarmacs of beauty and pleasure. While that is an exaggeration because it is short, it is beautiful and it's ours to enjoy. I have mentioned before that nobody needs to travel to Tuscany in Italy when here in the Northeast we have the various river valleys of the King, Ovens and Kiewa to enjoy along with their food and wine, winding roads and beautiful scenery from the rivers, lakes, forests and mountains.

Here are some population figures for Tatong and district based upon the number of Tattler deliveries. For Tatong we have, from north to south, (Whitegate up to Spring Creek Rd and Ford's Bridge) and east to west, (Tiger Hill Rd and across to Moorngag) there is a total of 134 households and you will have to guess how many people to each household.

Moorngag has 7 households, plus 9 from the cemetery down the Swanpool Rd to Warnocks Rd, but as with all districts there are blended areas around the edges. Karn has 25 deliveries.

Samaria has a total of 40 deliveries and Molyullah has 49. The final district of 44 deliveries is from Whitegate to near Benalla and the south side of Kilfeera Rd. (The north side may still get the Lurg newsletter which is why they don't get a Tattler). The Kilfeera Rd delivery extends from Emu Bridge Rd to the Myhrree turnoff.

349 Tattlers are currently printed and the 31 not counted above are for former district residents now living in Benalla, postal subscribers and the Tavern and Swanpool Store customers. Mike Larkin

Dear Steph

When I wrote this a week ago I was unaware that the Timber trucks specifically "B doubles" travel on this road under a permit which VICROADS are in the process of withdrawing. This would result in the use of Semi trailers and thus increasing the volume of traffic by in excess of 30%. This has been done without consultation with the community. This road has carried these" B doubles" since they were legalised by VicRoads whom had the intention of reducing the truck traffic volume this has been permitted for some 15 years. This operated under a reduced registration cost.

The road was rejuvenated in the 1960's us-1. ing natural gravels which have a load carrying capacity in the order of 50% of Engineered pavements (FCR or deep lift asphalt)

The pavement width is in the order of 4.6m 2. ie 2.3 per lane with unsealed shoulders of less than 0.5m The renovated Westgate bridge lane width is 3.1m for the unidirectional lanes

Currently between Benalla and Tatong 3. crossroads Chainage 26,100 the horizontal and vertical geometry are generally satisfactory subject PS While you're at it the whole length of road has to 2

4. From the crossroads to Ford's bridge some 12,000m the geometry needs considerable improvement to conform to current standards for curve speed compliance and vertical sight distance recognition.

The narrow lane widths have by their nature 5. increased the RAL (repetitive axel loadings) and a consequential increase in the speed of pavement and edge breakup

Clearly the Vicroads solution is not a solution the damage has already been done and increasing the number of vehicles does not decrease the total tonnage of timber removed. In fact the axle tonnage miles will increase due to the inefficient nature of semi trailers. Ie the original reason the "B Doubles" were introduced

When the "B Doubles were introduced no exemptions were provided for roads that did not satisfy the required pavement conditions




