#### From Humble Beginnings

I had the good fortune to catch up with Maggi Kirk the other day. Maggi and her then husband Greg ran the Tatong Post Office for some years during the eighties and early nineties before the Post Office was closed. She was happy to give me her recollections about the origins of The Tatong Tattler, now proudly issuing its 300<sup>th</sup> edition.

Maggi and Greg were part of a group of local people who instigated The Tatong And District Progress Association Newsletter . In August 1991 it became known as The Tatong Tattler when a competition was run to establish a masthead which was won by Larissa Scott, now Larissa Montgomery. Maggi told me the newsletter was started to inform the community about local events ie. school news, tennis and football club fixtures and results. The first edition was October 1990 (see centre pages) and held such information as a raffle to raise funds, the avenue of trees, each of which was sponsored by a local family and notice of a Progress association meeting.

Maggi would type the newsletter, which was then photocopied at the school and approximately 100 copies were printed. These were placed in the pigeon holes in the Post Office, the outlying copies being delivered by the Post Office Contractor who delivered up the hill towards Tolmie three days a week.

The masthead changed to its present format in October 2000.

After many years of organising the Tatong Tattler, Maggi felt that it needed new input and handed over the reigns to Bev Hakkennes in August1996.




Until 2005, the printing was done at the Tatong Primary School and by Benalla Printers. When the school closed the committee bought a printer and Michael Turner donated the computer to











































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#### **Some History About the Tattler**


I first knew of the Tattler when living 'over the hill' in Samaria, between 1989 and 1997, when we would occasionally find a copy in our mailbox. One memory of it sticks in my mind and that was the cricket articles by Max Jones. Max was a writer of the creative style which gave his stories a 'must read' edge, for me. Who else would think, in a cricket report, to mention; "the still steaming kidney lay limply in the keeper's glove ..." a vivid image of the havoc wreaked by a viciously delivered ball to the hapless batsman! Unfortunately Max's writing was a tad too vivid for a small town newsletter and he eventually took his talent elsewhere.

This article is one of a number dealing with the history aspects of the Tattler so there may be some repeats of stories. I spoke to Greg Kirk, Bev Hakkennes, Kerryn Gaudion to gather more detail as they were the successive Tattler producers before me and wife Maeve. As Maeve and I started to 'burn out' with the demands of the job we called a meeting to gain support and got it. The excellent committee of 10 which the Tattler now has works consistently year after year to keep the editions running. By spreading the workload the job is rewarding but not too hard.

Firstly Greg, who was an original member of the Tatong Progress Association which started in 1990, and one of the first people to type the newsletter. Greg lived in the general store, Post Office situated opposite the Tavern with his then wife Maggi (who is spoken of in another article) and he now lives in Swanpool. The newsletter eventually became a more general district newsletter called the Tatong Tattler with news and notices about

more than just the Progress Association. The newsletter was printed courtesy of Irene Erskine and the Primary School.

The Progress Association also initiated the renovation of the Tatong bridge picnic area, in association with the 'Dept. of name changes' and the setting up of Neighbourhood Watch led by Ray Fransico. The tree plantation along the north side of the Tatong-Moorngag Rd may also have been started by the Association and then at a later stage Anne Doherty was the initiator of the south side tree planting plus filling the gaps caused by dead trees on the north side. Some of the original committee of the Progress Association were Wally Schafer, Pat Manser, Peter Maher and Greg Kirk and Irene Anderson. Other active locals around that time were the Hakkennes', Ritchies, Scotts, Heveys, Mansers, Evans, Erskines, too many Lewis's to mention, the Lindsays Rosemary Williams, Nita McCauly and Max Jones. As I am a relative newcomer, I am mentioning those people that I do know about, but there are many others who contributed in other areas such as sport plus all of the committees which keep a community alive. An example of community action was the 60 people who attended the launch of Neighbourhood Watch in Tatong At some stage the young Larissa Scott (now Montgomery) won a school competition to design the heading for the newsletter. I believe that the three hills depicted in the original (and the current logo), depict the wavy line created by the junction of the forest and farmland on the first hillside when looking toward Tatong. This view can be seen from a point just after the Hollands Creek Bridge at about the 17.5km mark, when driving toward Tatong from Benalla. Maeve and I arrived in Tatong in 1997 and became



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

Garden Daze The best time to plant a tree is 20 years ago - the next best time is now

August - According to Dr. Tim Entwhistle's system of the seasons (you may recall my earlier article) - marks the beginning of change ....

Sprinter (August and September), the early Australian spring, starts my seasonal year. It's when the bushland and our gardens burst into flower. It's also when that quintessential Australian plant, the wattle, is





the idea that we are moving away from the cold and duller days of Winter. As well as the Acacias starting to flower, I like to watch the Almond trees at the top of my neighbour's driveway harbingers of Spring - they are the first to blossom.

Growing Citrus - When starting the garden here, some citrus were amongst the first fruiting trees that we planted. A Lime, two different types of Naval Orange, a Valencia, Seville (with Marmalade in mind) two different Mandarins and a Tangelo. All of which were planted in a couple of rows along a fence.

The following summer brought the worst grasshopper plague that I have seen here, and the citrus trees were only saved by being swathed in lots of old net curtains from the Op Shop. Even then they were pretty well chewed and only just struggled back to life - this was when I learned not to prune until they had sorted themselves out. To this day they are a bit too scraggley (a word for John Knapper) around their lower limbs.

Over the years some have thrived, while others have slowly declined. First to go were a couple of Mandarines - but this was an accident with a husband and a ride on lawn mower (he didn't quite come off unscathed either, but some stitches and a rest helped there) then the next to leave us was the Tangello - taking its lovely fruit with it, followed by one of the Naval Oranges. The Grapefruit is still hanging in, but clearly its days are numbered.

I could see no reason for their decline and extra TLC only seemed to make it worse. Therefore I was very interested in a story on Gardening Australia about grow-

> ing citrus successfully. Ian Tolley a long time citrus grower advised:

"Make up your mind that the variety is what you want, get the right rootstock, make sure that you plant it properly, make sure the nutrition is ok and learn to shape the tree - you're there for life, because generally no matter where you are living, you can grow a good variety, so long as you get the right rootstock - that's

the important thing - so the selection of the variety is not as important as having the rootstock, because that does so many things for you. We're aiming to put a root system underneath your variety which is resistant to plant pests and diseases in the soil. We're also going to influence the maturity of the fruit, we're going to improve the quality of the fruit - all of those things are very important - so we need to select the right rootstock for the right area, the right soil, the right climate all of those factors."

Ahh I see....I have no idea what rootstock any of my citrus have been grown on - maybe at the nursery I was asked, but at that stage being new to the area, any advice I would have given them would have been somewhat uninformed.

Curiosity had me looking in the bookshelf for the Citrus Catalogue I had from when we made those long ago purchases.


Sure enough on page 4 under the heading Considering Purchase of Trees is the advice:

Remember these points before you commit yourself:

- Is the rootstock best suited to my soil type and location?
- Is the budline one that is proven in my area?
  - Is the rootstock-scion combination safe and the best for my area in terms of tree life, production and fruit quality?

Independent advice on these matters can be obtained from your local Department of Agriculture, Horticultural Officer.

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
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involved with the newsletter in about 2000 and eventually took on the whole job. I needed to become better known in the district so that I could get enough work, as an electrician, to pay off our first time mortgage - "you get out what you put in!"

Also, as a part time artist and having grown up in small towns I wanted to write and draw cartoons plus help create community spirit and connection. While I liked to write Maeve did the typing and layout and I organized the distribution and deliveries. Since those days of handwritten articles I have learned to touch type, a useful skill, and most articles now arrive as email with or without photo or advert attachments.

We have had loyal deliverers from day one and now there are about 20 zones and 18 deliverers encompassing the district which includes Samaria, Moorngag, Karn, Whitegate, Emu Bridge, Molyullah and the whole Tatong valley. Benalla currently has 23 deliveries mainly to people previously living in the delivery district. We print and deliver 350 with about 50 online readers. By using the Tattler's own printer the monthly cost for each edition is about \$250 according to the amount of paper and toner used. At 11 editions per year that is an annual cost of \$2750 which is largely covered by our ads and donations. In my early days with the Tattler only about 120 copies were printed and delivered mainly to the Tatong valley only and our financial status was usually precarious then critical when no longer able to print at the school. While Benalla Council grants helped in those difficult times. buying our own printer and attracting sufficient paying ads and donations was the eventual solution.

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

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#### - Product Review -Stopping the "Swampy" from **Cooling the House over Winter**

We built a cottage in 1985, fitted with an evaporative cooler. Come winter, it was quickly noticeable that the house heat was escaping up the cooler vents. I fashioned some vent-covers out of polystyrene, fitted with magnets to hold them on, and covered them with remnants from our curtains. It worked beautifully, although puzzled guests would ask what the things on the ceiling were. In 2002 we replicated the cottage on our White Gate (Tatong) farm, again fitted with evaporative cooling. The only snag was, the vents were now plastic. So twice a year I stood on a ladder and closed or opened the vanes in the vents. Not too hard with 8-foot ceilings. Now we have moved to a house where the ceilings are 10 foot up. Standing under the vents, I could feel the heat rushing up into the evaporative ducting. But with higher ceilings, and me a bit older, the climbing-up-the-ladder malarkey was less attractive. We wondered what we might cobble together to replicate the things I made 30 years before. Also, I went online, in case someone else had solved the problem. And blow me down, they had. A search found "Green It Yourself", recommending Heat Savers, with a very nice little video showing how to fit them (or how to use Contact, if renting; https:// www.youtube.com/watch?v=nTEAnLwY4NU) and www.heatsaver.com.au/ itself, where very smart covers



to the plastic vent, enabling the cover to fit magnetically. And they are Made in Australia. We ordered some for the living area, and they made such a difference that we promptly ordered some for the rest of the house. Friends having

expressed interest, I said I would put something in the Tattler; so I asked the Heat Saver people how they came to create the business. This is their story.

"We had built our home in central west NSW, in a small town called Parkes. I was huddled over a gas heater trying to stay warm, Adrian had been running cables in the ceiling and came down through the manhole drenched in sweat.

He said "it's as warm as toast up there, all the heat is going up through the air conditioner vents. Go online and order some covers for the vents".

Try as I may I couldn't find any covers anywhere. He said "someone should make covers for the vents" and I said "well you're someone

and you're looking for a new business idea, why not see what you and Dion (our son) can come up with". After much trial and error and many modifications 9+ years later here we are." -Adrian and Jenny Cotter





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

#### CELTIC FESTIVAL - WEEK OF 25-27<sup>TH</sup> AUGUST

Once again we will be bringing you a weekend of music from various musicians who will be playing throughout the day and night at the Tavern for all visitors. If you love the sound of Celtic music then this is the place to come and enjoy a few days of great music, food, drink and laughter.

As this is the 300 Edition of the Tattler, I thought some history of the Tavern might be in order. "This extract came from the Benalla Ensign in 2011", after which I have added on information collected from our own Web Page History.

It's been almost 90 years since the Tatong Tavern was rebuilt following a devastating fire in 1923, but standing outside the tavern, it feels as though not much has changed. The tavern, located 25 km south east of Benalla on the Benalla-Tatong Rd, has the look and feel of an old English pub, with a mock Tudor facade transporting you to a different place and time.

The original weatherboard hotel was built by Mr Edward (Ted) Brown for Mr William Worrall, in the 1880's with, as the story goes, money earned from gold mined in the hills surrounding the small town. The present concrete building was erected for Mr. M. C. Clarke. The contractor was Mr. Alex Wallace with Tom McCauley and Ernie Crowe helping with the construction.

A meeting point for locals since the 1880s, the tavern has a rich history displayed on the walls of a variety of memorabilia. Photos and newspaper articles adorn the walls in the dining area, while a photo of the original owners hangs on the wall in the dining room.

Not far down the road is the site where Ned Kelly and his gang shot three police officers at Stringybark Creek, becoming Australia's most wanted in the process.

In 1978, the pub was the site of a shoot up, in which two youths fired 15 shots at and inside the pub after being asked to leave. Fortuitously, a journalist from the BENALLA ENSIGN was at the establishment that night, and was able to document the event in detail. A copy of his article is on display.

While the bushfires of 2007 came perilously close to claiming the Tatong Tavern, the premise escaped the flames and continues to prosper.

Extensive renovations have been undertaken over the years, including works to the bar area and the removal of inside walls. What was previously a bedroom in the rebuilt tavern is now a dining area, while fireplaces and chimneys have also been added.

And it wouldn't be an old country pub without a ghost story or two. Patrons and staff alike have reported seeing a white apparition of a woman wandering through the front door and around the establishment, thought to be Mrs Catherine Worrall.

The name has also undergone change, what was once known as the Tatong Hotel or 'Pub' is now known as the Tatong Tavern. In 1982/83 an attempt to establish a nursery in the grounds of the 'Pub' resulted in a building being added for use as an office, display area, as well as the placement of an ex V.R. Guards van, for storage. However, this venture did not succeed, and all signs of it other than the building that is now used as accommodation has been removed.

- School buses. Are bright yellow and when

they stop, traffic going both ways must stop, so that there is no, or little, chance of a child being run over. We should adopt that system as it works well and everybody accepts it. Perhaps a pollie is reading this and could start something useful!!

And so to some other observations. There is a TV ad for one of the burger chains, Wendy's, which condemns Australian beef as a frozen, imported second rate meat. O

#### Why is it important to pump my septic tank out regularly?

Over time scum and sludge layers build up in your septic tank, eventually limiting the amount of available liquid. This does not allow the septic tank to perform one of its basic functions - to allow for settling of solids below the outlet level. The waste will then flow directly on to the next part of the system untreated. If this situation persists, the scum and sludge will flow through to the distribution field, eventually causing blockages and malfunction - a messy, smelly and costly exercise to repair.

It is recommended that septic tanks are pumped out every 3 - 5 years


#### **Local Lerps Infestation**

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
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leaves and trees (don't think he has a sweet tooth) so hopefully this also gives the other trees some time to recuperate!





Early on the afternoon of Friday June 27th Tatong and district residents were startled by an earthquake.

The main shock which measured 3.8 on the Richter scale is classed as minor. However many residents were considerably startled by the event, and there were many calls to local authorities and newspapers.

The earthquake was rather localised only affecting the Tatong, Samaria, Swanpool area. Local publican Greg Tainton said the glasses above the bar got a good swing up, and all the "top shelf" bottles gravitated towards the edges of the shelves.

Mt Joy Rd, Residents Pat and John Manser returned home to find considerable clumps of earth and dust on the floor inside their mud brick residence. Not aware there had been an earthquake they were rather mystified until they were enlightened. Pat Manser felt three considerable noticable shocks during the day after.

There have been continuing after shocks and rumblings in the past month described by Pat Manser as sounding like "distant quarry explosions"

Samaria is at the centre of a minor subterranan fault and the area could experience further tremors at any time according to the Sismology Centre. Mt Joy residents Chris Jesson and Liz Tapp were awaken from their reverie at 10pm Sunday night by a considerable jolt after effects of the carthquake.






