She was so critical that she was transferred to ICU transport to the Butterfly Ward, the Newborn Intensive Care Unit at the Royal Children's Hospital.

For the next 3.5 weeks she was cared for on life support and the staff looked after her through to her full recovery.

For a period of 2 weeks she was the most critical newborn in the unit. The staff, consultants, nurses and doctors cared for her 24/7 and enabled her to breathe on her own for the first time after 3 weeks. Willow has now made a full recovery.

De Fiasco in de Fiords (Part 3)



Did I say restive trip down the Rhine? We start in Amsterdam, most of the passengers are staying at the same hotel pre cruise, so we get to meet quite a few before we even start. I have a really sore back, too many uneven steps and stairs and cobblestones, so I go on a quest for painkillers only to be told I need a prescription for painkillers. You can smell the marijuana wafting down the street but I need a script to buy a painkiller. Amsterdam has even more cyclists than Copenhagen and they have right of way,



seem to come at you from every direction.

We leave Amsterdam in the Scenic Ruby, it's good to unpack and catch up with some washing. Our cabin is very comfortable and the view is wonderful, sliding along the river. The next day we arrive in Cologne then at night visit Marksburg Castle for a medieval feast and entertainment. We continue through the Rhine Gorge, arriving in Freudenberg the next day for an Oktoberfest and Bavarian Lunch. Incredibly, the people sharing our table come from King Valley, and are distant relatives. Arriving back at the ship we find they are in the cabin next to us.

We continue down the Rhine, Wurzburg, Rothenburg, Bamberg, Nuremberg, Regensburg and Weltenburg. Apparently 'Burg' is a castle and 'Berg' a mountain. In Regensburg I join the 'slow walkers' group, still suffering with a bad back, for the tour. Unfortunately the 'slow walkers' drop off very quickly with only 4 of us continuing, passing the fast walkers and finishing way ahead of everyone else. Yay!

We have now left the Rhine and the Maine Canal behind and have entered the Da-

nube River. The locks used to lift the ships along the Trans European waterway are astounding. Two at the top are more than 30 metres in depth. We have been going up the locks, now we are going down the other side of the watershed.

Having left Germany and entered Austria we arrive in Salzburg to a 'Sound of Music' day. A visit to the abbey graveyard seen in the movie is very interesting. It must still be in use with quite recent dates on gravestones. A morning tea of delicious apple strudel, the best ever tasted apparently.

Then onto a Sound of Music lunch with entertainment and everyone joining the singing.

Next day we visit Melk Abbey, one of the biggest and most beautiful baroque buildings in Europe, featuring splendid architecture with the monastic library renowned for its extensive manuscript collections. Then on to beautiful Vienna with a performance at the Spanish Riding School a highlight for me. A Viennese Concert at the Liechtenstein Palais is another highlight.

Next it's on to Budapest, the capital of Hungary with a population of 1.7 million. More knock-out architecture, thermal baths and a rather sad history of occupation. We are sad to be leaving our home of the past 2 weeks too. There have been many entertainments on board that I haven't mentioned, mostly culturally

connected to the port of call. The Hungarian dance troupe were a stand out, with much slapping and jumping. There have been many theme nights as well, disco with the crew or just enjoying the piano in the lounge area.

Prague is as splendid as everyone says, Prague Castle, the Charles Bridge, the Old Town and a walking tour exploring the communist era. My next job is to sort the thousands of photos that I've taken, each one a wonderful memory.

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
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FISH AND CHIPS AT MOLYULLAH

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

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
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
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1t's Mid April as I write and we have had some rain at last - let's hope there's more on the way.

So it's autumn and true to form egg laying has dropped right off as everyone sheds their feathers and the hours of daylight shorten. Some of the girls are looking decidedly scraggly. We've not lost any more chickies to the hawk despite it visiting several more times. And just the other morning saw a large red fox run up to the pens. It disappeared quick smart when I put in an appearance.



The pallets chook shed is now at a point where it's almost done – a roof and wire for the pens, and



doors are all that is required. The watering system we can install later. We're also investigating our portable electric fence options for the rotational grazing of our sheep and the poultry that won't be living in the permanent pens.

Our tomatoes are still producing and ripening, so I haven't pulled them yet. I've put a chook tractor on the front bed and have the two Gold Legbar girls working it. Originally we had three cockerels who hadn't started crowing yet. Guess what? Within days they started crowing!!!

I didn't get round to planting pumpkins this year, except one, I think it's from the giant pumpkin we carved for Halloween while living in Heathcote. It's still growing so I'll leave it there until the first frosts. It's so big we

parked our car on it – hahaha – it's a matchbox just to give you an idea on size. Anyway, gotta go, time is running away on me. Write you again next month!

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
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
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The two sides of human nature.
