## That is changes in the position of the Printing and Distribution Coordinator for the Tattler.



#### Time to start thinking about spring

planting - As we take out our seed collection an important question is:

#### How long will vegetable seeds remain viable?

The viability of seeds is dependant upon storage, with ideal storage conditions being "somewhere cool and dry". A closed jar or food storage box in the refrigerator is a good option, while the garden shed although handy to where they will be used, is not a good place to keep seeds as the conditions are too hot in the summer.

Check seeds for quality. Large seeds that are usually smooth and round (or plump), will not germinate well if they have become pocked or wrinkled. Peas, corn, and many other seeds are normally wrinkled but may not look as good as they should.

If in doubt - test for germination. Count out at least 20 seeds - spread onto damp paper toweling and roll them up so that the seeds stay separated, then place the roll into a plastic bag and keep it in a warm place. (around 25 degrees C). When some seeds have sprouted, and a one-week wait indicates that no more are about to emerge - divide the number of seeds germinated by the number of seeds tested to find out your germination percentage.

The table below is an indication of the viability of various seeds.

Perlite / Vermiculite What & Why?



Perlite and Vermiculite are similar but work in different ways. Both will - aerate the soil - retain moisture - impart nutrients.

Perlite is added to the soil of plants which need to dry out between watering, such as cacti or succulents.

**Perlite** is made from volcanic rock, which is heated and crushed until it explodes (like Popcorn - only a lot tougher) in

order to transform the rock into small white pieces. Perlite has a neutral pH level, holds nutrients and three to four times its weight in water, is clean, sterile, odorless, and non-toxic. Works as a lightweight sand substitute. Won't rot or go mouldy.

The white granular pieces contain about 6 percent water, which will help lighten and loosen heavy, compacted garden soils.

Perlite helps insulate plant roots from extreme temperature fluctuations, is great for seed starting mixes and blending custom potting mix.

Vermiculite is best used for water-loving plants that need their soil to stay moist at all times.



Vermiculite is magnesium-aluminium-iron silicate, an all-natural mineral product, mined and processed into a soil additive which increases water and nutrient retention levels in soil.

Great for seed starting or blending your own custom potting soil mix. Helps to lighten and loosen heavy, compacted soil types, retain moisture and nutrients.



Mixes easily and well with soil and is clean, sterile, non-toxic, and odourless.

Vermiculite will retain more water for longer and hold more water in general than Perlite.

#### Hacked!

The Tatong Tattler email account was hacked. It was out of our hands for less than a day, and we regained access to it using the Security Contacts set up in the account.

The Tattler email account has several email addresses listed as Security Contacts. Yahoo allows multiple addresses to be listed, whereas GMail allows only one email address as plus one Mobile phone number, in the Security settings.

We knew something was wrong when the Security Contact emails all received notification that the TatongTattler account password had been changed. Once we found that none of us had changed it, we went to retrieve our email account.

Using the 'Forgot Password' process, a confirmation code was sent to one of the Security Contacts, enabling us to change the password again.

Also, Gmail can get upset if you try to access a Gmail account from an unfamiliar device; it may demand further proof. (Every time I re-image my operating system, Gmail reckons I'm using an unfamiliar device.)

#### Why is it important to pump my septic tank out regularly?

Over time scum and sludge layers build up in your septic tank, eventually limiting the amount of available liquid. This does not allow the septic tank to perform one of its basic functions - to allow for settling of solids below the outlet level. The waste will then flow directly on to the next part of the system untreated. If this situation persists, the scum and sludge will flow through to the distribution field, eventually causing blockages and malfunction - a messy, smelly and costly exercise to repair.

It is recommended that septic tanks are pumped out every 3 - 5 years

Attempts at revenge were rarely successful here either. Before you could land the killer blow, you would hear, "MUMMY, MUMMY..."


If you didn't suffer either of these, perhaps you were just lucky – or maybe you actually were that goody-goody child.

The content of a PDF file can be difficult to extract.


