Gawn to Town

Farmer Gone Feral

From working a farm, we are down to a 5-acre paddock. It makes a nice outlook, and is good place to walk. These larger outlying blocks usually end up subdivided, once the novelty wears off off, and the mowing and weeding gets too much. This little paddock won't suffer that fate, for once or twice a decade the Hollands creek comes to visit. It has a peek at the upland world, then retreats to it's bed, leaving a gift package of every weed our colonist forbears brought with them. Fair point.

I delight in our paddock, planting native shrubs, grasses and trees amidst the pasture; evicting weeds; and slashing the enthusiastic growth. For the first couple of years, I aimed for a nice even finish. As soon as it grew back to knee-high; less comfortable to walk in, and more comfortable for the snakes; I'd slash it again. Slashing five acres ought be a small task, but farming has left me with Issues, and tractor time is limited.

One aim is for the paddock to offer the birds somewhere to hang out. Well-slashed expanses are a bit daunting to the little birds... and I began leaving tussocks. Little stands of oats (a crop of chaffing oats must have once gone in, and re-grows every year). And having seen the little red-browed finches enjoying the wretched fog-grass, I began leaving tufts of it for them.

One day, I noticed a nice stand of something green, which turned out to be... a rush. Subversive thought; maybe rushes weren't a dreadful thing, but quite fitting. (The farmers will stop reading at this point.) I've seen rushes for sale as tubestock, and here they were, doing their damndest to grow for free. Next slashing, I found I was dodging the odd rush. A while later a farming friend commented, amused, that she had observed newcomers encouraging rushes to grow, and I realised just how much my attitude was changing.

Then one season as the grass shot up, I slashed just a few paths, to get me though to the proper slashing. The next week I did some more paths. It is less efficient, but then again I'm leaving the spots that haven't much growth. And it is fun to walk in. I have a changing network of paths, in a changing landscape.

Then there was the Sheep Sorrel. It took me a couple years to work out what it was, by which time it had spread. It was also materialising all throughout the district. I learnt it is devilish hard to get rid of. Battle was brief; I considered my resources, and surrendered. Now I snarl at it, and try to appreciate that it doesn't need much slashing, and is quite a pretty colour. But I can't say I've warmed to it, as I did to the rushes.

My paddock might not delight a meticulous farmer. Uneven grass height, rushes, and clumps of fog-grass. But I like it, the birds like it, the dog likes it; the snakes aren't dancing all through it. It is a nice paddock, for a retired farmer - if slightly feral.

The Meaning of Tatong

A question at the October meeting was as to the origin of the name "Tatong".

Research by B J Savill of the Royal Historical Society of Victoria, for Mr G. Campbell, Headmaster of Tatong Primary School notes that, "The first known occupant of this particular area was William Francis Splatt from 1847 to 1850 when he died. His brothers Frank and Edmund Lasky renewed the pastoral licence yearly from 1850 to 1854. The Splatt brothers gave the name Tatong to their run. It is a corruption of the aboriginal word 'TUTTING' meaning 'out of sight'."

However the 1978 "Back to Tatong" booklet gives the meaning as "Water Hole".

If anyone can cast further light on this, we would be most grateful to record it!

Check-In "Favourites"

I'm not very tech savvy, but recently learnt a new trick on the Service Victoria app.

To use this new function, you will need to update the app, unless it's been recently installed.




When visiting a business

displaying the QR code, check in as normal & then you will notice on the bottom of the screen a message asking you to 'Save as a favourite check

Once you have saved this favourite, tap on the icon on the home page that looks like a square with a circular arrow in the middle of it (clock icon). It is to the left of the 'check in' rectangle.

This will take you to the page that shows 'Favourite' & 'History'.

Just scroll down the 'Favourites', until you find the business you are visiting again. Tap on this business & it will automatically ask you to check in. Hope this helps - Beth Gregory



I would like to respond to Andrea's request for opinions about using apostrophes when writing about decades such as the 1920s.

I was taught that apostrophes should be used for possessives, such as 'the dog's tail', and in contractions where a letter has been omitted, as in 'don't' instead of 'do not'. Neither of these criteria apply to the 1920s, in most cases. The 1920s is a plural, so it should not have an apostrophe.

However, I think there is an exception when the decade is being used as a possessive, such as '1920s' music' (i.e. music of the 1920s). In this case the apostrophe needs to be placed after the 's' because it is referring to the music of many years. If the apostrophes is placed before the 's' (1920's music), it would be referring to the music of just one year, i.e. 1920.

While we are on the subject of apostrophes, perhaps it would be more appropriate to call the meetings at the Tatong Memorial Hall 'The Girls' Shed' rather than 'The Girl's Shed', as I expect more than one girl attends these meetings!

Additional - adding a Vaccination Certificate to the VicGov app. - Andi Stevenson

The updated Service Victoria app asked if I wanted to attach my vaccination certificate? I was about to enter a shop at the time... so did it later.

Re-opening the Service Victoria app, it said, "Show proof of vaccination when you check in!" That led to a web page, offering me four options to get my proof of vaccination, one of which was removing it (?!) But I took Option 2, add it to the VicService app. Ploughed through bumf the length of War and Peace, then followed the link to MyGov, & logged in. once I remembered my user name & password. A few more taps and I had the certificate, closed all the apps, and re-opened the VicService app. It still had the big banner telling me to attach my vaccine certificate! But a tap on either icon left of "Check In" took me to "Favourites" (see Beth's article, above) "History" (handy if you want to know where you were last week) and "Certificates" - there it was.

GardenDaze

With a wetter Spring than usual the grass is growing at a great rate and the same can be said for the weeds in my garden.

Alstroemeria, also known as Peruvian Lilies, are native to South America where they occur mostly in the Andes. They have lush foliage and produce an abundance of colourful blooms from late spring



through to early autumn. With contrasting shades (and whiskers), the flowers will last in a vase for two weeks, making them an excellent choice for cut

flowers. Suitable for partial sunny conditions they grow well in garden beds, borders, or containers.

Alstroemeria – seen at their best naturalized under trees or on sloping banks - are planted from seed or root divisions in Autumn and enjoy plenty of water until the leaves yellow. They grow well in sun or light shade in a well enriched, well drained acidic soil. They soon form large clumps bearing dozens of flowerheads.

Whilst they are frost hardy it is advisable to protect the dormant tubers with mulch. They are best left undisturbed when established, but one year old seedlings will transplant well.

Orange was the basic colour of these flowers, but modern hybrids now produce colours of white, pink. Yellow and brick red. Atroemeria pulchella is sometimes known as the New Zealand Christmas Bell although the plant has its origins in Brazil.

Alstromeria are prominent in the cut flower trade, the blooms being bred commercially under glass to protect the flowers.

When you wish to cut the flowers of Alstroemeria to bring inside for a vase. "Cutting" is not the right expression. The blooms need to be pulled from the base (similar to picking rhubarb). This will stimulate the roots of the plant and produce more small tubers.



Once "pulled" the stem can be cut to the length desired.

Spring in the Garden

This is the time of the year when just about anything you fancy in the Summer Vegie range can be planted. It is also the time that I find it is not a good idea to get too carried away with a seed catalogue in front of me.

As most of my Veg Garden is now in Wicking Beds, I thought that having tomatoes that did not grow too tall would be a good idea and to that end I purchased Silvery Fir Tree – Red fruit, slightly flattened shape,

compact plant to 60 cm - silvery grey foliage with a carrot shape - eye catching in hanging baskets or on patios. (I am presuming that the "carrot like shape" is the foliage and not the tomato!)



Scoresby - Round red

fruit, excellent flavour, 4 – 6 cm great for preserves and sauce, disease resistant and could be used for rootstock. (This last sounds a bit too advanced for me!)

Wapsipinicon Peach – originated in 1890 under the name White Peach and is named after the Wapsipinicon river in north east Iowa USA - Yellow round fruit to 40 cm, tough fuzzy skin, excellent taste smooth texture. The reason for this purchase was that the "tough fuzzy skin" is reputed to deter the dreaded Fruit Fly. Time will tell.

Why is it important to pump my septic tank out regularly?


Over time scum and sludge layers build up in your septic tank, eventually limiting the amount of available liquid. This does not allow the septic tank to perform one of its basic functions - to allow for settling of solids below the outlet level. The waste will then flow directly on to the next part of the system untreated. If this situation persists, the scum and sludge will flow through to the distribution field, eventually causing blockages and malfunction - a messy, smelly and costly exercise to repair.

It is recommended that septic tanks are pumped out every 3 - 5 years

The cleaned & painted top section has a slot at the very top, for Tattler items to be posted.


