Meet Whitegate's newest resident, **Tucker**.

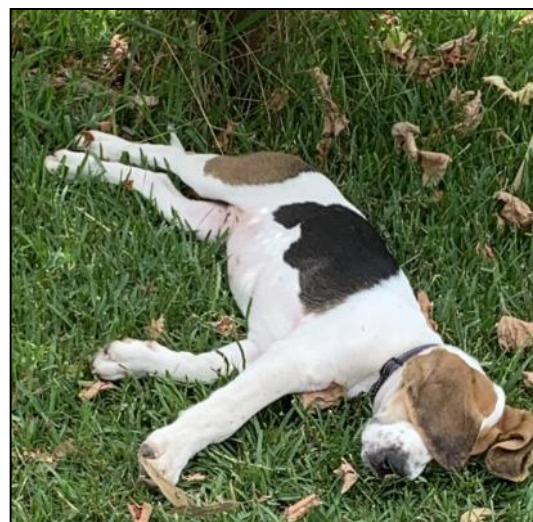
Tucker is a 5 month old tri-colour harrier from Tolmie. He responds well to "sit", "lay", "shake hands" and "bugger off".

FILM REVIEW BELFAST

KENNETH BRANAGH'S TALE OF A CHILDHOOD DURING NORTHERN IRELAND'S TROUBLES.

A semi-autobiographical film written and directed by Kenneth Branagh.

Set in 1969, at the start of the country's infamous Troubles, Belfast is a bittersweet memoir, childhood innocence complicated by the turmoil of a different world to come.

The movie is mostly shot in black and white which makes it feel very appropriate to the time when many of us were watching the moon landing in grainy black and white.

Buddy is a 9 year old primary schooler living with his working class Protestant family, his teenage brother, William, Mother and often absent Father, a joiner who frequently works away in England to pay for his family's mounting debts.

Men have landed on the moon but Northern Ireland is beset by civil unrest and Buddy's street- a mix of working class Protestant and Catholic families- is a target.

Soon helicopters are circling overhead, British soldiers are patrolling the streets and a barricade of rubble, barbed wire and burnt out cars has been erected.

The film is charming with its portrayal of childhood despite the almost constant threat of violence. Buddy's interaction with his family and particularly his Grandparents, played by Judi Dench and Ciaran Hinds pull at the heartstrings.

There are scenes of rioting and mob violence, the Troubles haunt nearly every scene but next to the barricades the kids play football.

Music by Van Morrison adds another dimension to a wonderful movie, definitely worth seeing.

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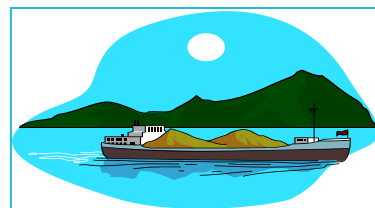
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View from the Warbies

Austrian artist Eugene von Guerard came to Australia in 1852, hoping to find gold. He didn't strike it rich, which was sad for him; but so lucky for the preservation of some history of Australia. To make a living he went back to his profession, sketching and painting scenes of an Australia in a state of transition. In an era when photography was new and rare, and cameras extremely cumbersome, von Guerard travelled through the bush, the farms and the goldfields, capturing the landscape.

One sketch he made was from an outcrop of what we know as the Warbies. Major Mitchell didn't ask the locals what they named the granite range; passing by in 1836 he named it "Futter's range". When Ben Warby took up the Killawarra section around 1844, the area became known as the "Warby Ranges" (phew).

In 1862, Eugene von Guerard sat somewhere on the south eastern spurs, and sketched what he could see; a fine view over the plains, and in the distance, Mt Buffalo and friends. But from where did he make this sketch? The Glenrowan gap doesn't feature; and von Guerard was pretty good on detail.

Sitting at the Glenrowan Vintage Hall, looking up at Mt Glenrowan, my sister Jan and I wondered what the view was like from up there. So we went to find out.

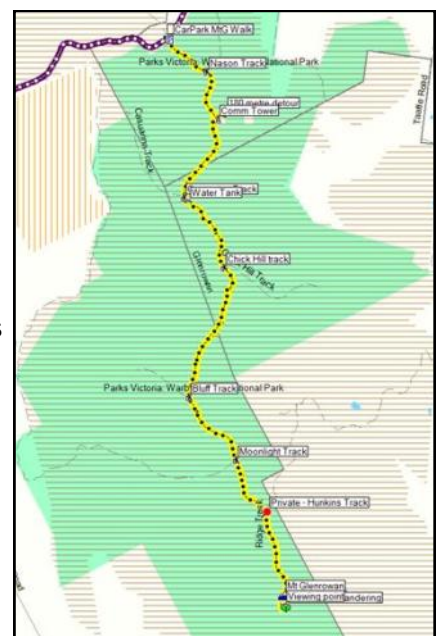
To do the "Mt Glenrowan" Warbies walk we left the car at a car-park on the Taminick Gap road, and set off up a sealed path to the communication tower, then onwards south on a gravel track. It is a little over 4km to "Mt Glenrowan" and "Morgan's Lookout". As we reached the southern end, the first clear landmark I caught sight of was the McDonalds sign on the freeway! The view is spectacular, even when showers obscure Mt Buffalo. The scene of Glenrowan below is lovely, although the quarry behind it is a bit of a blight on the landscape. With binoculars I could even see Big Ned; he doesn't hide so effectively these days.

It was a grand view, but it wasn't the one Eugene had sketched 160 years ago. Maybe he was south of Glenrowan, behind the quarry? Or perhaps from the eastern side of the Warbies. None of these are public land, so it is tricky to check. Do those three rocks still stand, and are they hidden by trees?

It was a lovely walk, and although we weren't walking fast, and had a good stop at the southern end, we took less than the four hours that Parks suggests.

There were some steep bits, and some skidding on loose gravel, but for the most part a pleasant, undulating track. Lovely bushland, some xanthorrhoea (grass trees) lurking along the way, and such a view to enjoy at the southern end! (Geoff Rintala could name some of the mountains in von Guerard's sketch - how many can you name?)

Garden Daze

The best time to plant a tree is 20 years ago - the next best time is now



Moving into the middle month of Autumn - shorter cooler days and time to think of planting some trees.

Salvias are tough, hardy plants that do well in our local climate. There are close to 1000 species of *Salvias* and they can be found in temperate, tropical and sub-tropical regions, from sea level to mountains.



Mexican Sage

There are no native Australian species - *Salvias* come mostly from the Americas, Europe and Asia.

Classified as annuals, biennials, perennials and herbaceous shrubs - provided they are well drained and get plenty of sun, they will grow equally well in rubbly clay or friable loam.

From groundcovers to three to four-metre-high shrubs, there is a *Salvia* to suit any climate, season and garden style. Most *Salvias* show off their flowers from spring through to autumn and are happy in garden beds or pots. Great for cutting - these aromatic beauties are beloved by bees and butterflies.

The first *salvias* I grew were from a cutting of the furry leaf Mexican Sage given by a friend, which in time produced a mass of pretty, bright purple flowers. When cut back in winter the stems made good cuttings - most of which grew. Soon I had them in pots around the garden and enough to give away to family and friends.

This had me on the look out for more varieties - most of which have come from the Benalla Market and the garden section of the local hardware.

Some of the more common *salvia* varieties are Spur-flower (*Plectranthus* sp.), Germander (*Teucrium* sp.), Coleus *Plectranthus* sp. syn. *Coleus* sp.), Basil (*Ocimum basilicum* cv.) and Sage (*Salvia officinalis*).

Some *Salvias* have herbal and medicinal properties among these are the Chia (*Salvia hispanica*), Clary Sage (*Salvia runcinate*) and the Chinese Red Sage (*Salvia miltiorrhiza*).

Salvias can be planted en masse for a display of colour in garden beds while the smaller more compact varieties make great decorative pots.

The name *Salvia* comes from the Latin word *salvere*, which means "to heal." *Salvia* has been used for its herbal and medicinal qualities since ancient times.

Planting and care - Mix some organic plant food into the soil before planting and give them some soluble fertiliser from time to time for strong growth and to keep them flowering well.

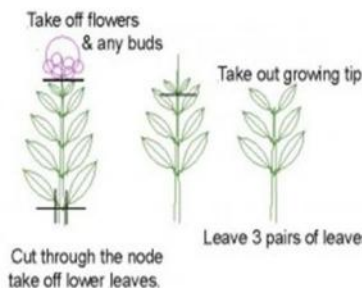
Although tolerant of moderate droughts, it is a good idea to protect their roots with mulch during prolonged periods of hot and dry weather.

Annual and perennial varieties can be pruned after flowering to remove spent flowers and stop them from becoming too top heavy, while the larger shrubby types should be cut to approximately 45cm from the ground in autumn, after which they will produce fresh new growth almost immediately

Propagation - *Salvias* can easily be propagated by either sowing seeds (for annual types) by taking cuttings or dividing old clumps (for biennial, perennial and herbaceous types).

Salvias grown by cuttings, will grow true to form.

Fill a small pot with potting mix - make a deep hole in the middle - fill this with Perlite.



Remove the bottom two nodes of leaves from the cutting and place into the perlite, up to the lowest set of leaves.

Keep in a protected place in the shade until new leaves form - then pot up into a larger pot.

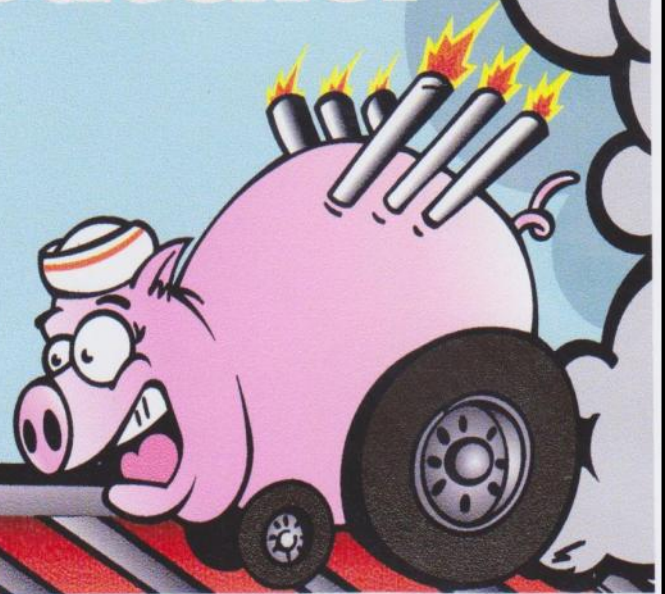

The Samaria run delivers to the south-western corner of the Tattler area. New residents will in time take over the Samaria Tattler Delivery run, but not for a while yet. So an emergency stand-in team are delivering the Samaria Tattlers.

In order to note where each Tattler should go, I did the run with Geoff Rintala, Geoff being familiar with that part of the world.

The March edition of the Tattler was being printed in the Tatong Rec Reserve rooms as we set off. The weather was a bit grey, with occasional drizzle.

By the time we reached the Samaria road at Moorngag, steady rain was falling. We dropped off a couple of bags of Tattlers to the mailboxes of delivery folk, then set off to deliver to Samaria.

Fortunately, most people have mailboxes these days, and most of them are rain-proof. Just as well; by the time we reached the Mt Samaria road, the rain was torrential. How it ran down that road! I would have got a photo, but it was raining too much to open the window. But here is a photo of sort of what it looked like.

Geoff remarked that his son, a road engineer, says there are 3 rules for road maintenance: (1) keep the water off the road; (2) keep the water off the road; and (3) keep the water off the road. There was a lot of water running down Mt Samaria road.

Geoff knew where most of the mailboxes were, although two of them were hiding amongst some wattles and kept dodging when we looked. Like an old fashioned navigational challenge, we hunted them down & nailed them in the end.

Eventually we had our Tattlers delivered, although two mailboxes were chock full of old mail, including last month's Tattler, giving the observant sleuth a hint that they were out of commission.

It was good to get up into the hills, even when the said hills were pouring with rain.

Getting out and about in some of the further reaches brings home just what a service the Tattler deliverers do. We print 315 Tattlers, which go out in bags to the volunteer Deliverers, who then distribute each individual Tattler to a resident.

With only a few left-over Tattlers, we drove back down to the Samaria Road, where the rain was falling gently, and made our way to Tatong, where there was no rain at all. Rain, what rain? Said the team printing the Tattlers. But my ute had been washed, and the Samaria run completed - the Tattlers had got through!

We hope that everyone who wants a physical Tattler gets one, and that none go to waste. And that none were soggy.

Locals can have a Tattler printed and delivered, or they can download a digital Tattler – indeed, they can have both. - *Andrea Stevenson*

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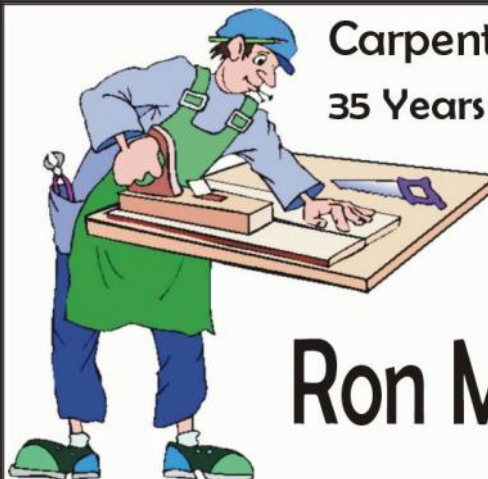
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Swanpool News

What's Happening at Molly Rose?

I know it's been awhile. Sorry about that. The following is a series of tweets by Jennifer Lynn Barnes that pretty much is describing my life at the moment and why it's been a while since I've put anything in the Tattler.

One time, I was at a Q&A with Nora Roberts, and someone asked her how to balance writing and kids, and she said that the key to juggling is to know that some of the balls you have in the air are made of plastic & some are made of glass.

And if you drop a plastic ball, it bounces, no harm done. If you drop a glass ball, it shatters, so you have to know which balls are glass and which are plastic and prioritize catching the glass ones.

Nora was not talking about juggling five balls. She was talking about juggling FIFTY-FIVE balls. The balls don't represent "family" or "work". There are separate balls for everything that goes into each of those categories. "Deadline on Project Y" or "crazy sock day at school"

And her point, addressing a room full of women, was not "prioritise kids over work." It was "some kid stuff is glass and some is plastic, and sometimes, to catch a glass work ball, you have to drop a plastic family one, and that is okay."

And the reverse is also true. Sometimes, to catch a glass kid ball, something at work has to slide, and that is okay, too.

If you are juggling 55 balls, some are going to drop, so you have to focus not on broad categories, but on the glass balls.

I think about this ALL THE TIME. I dropped more than one ball today. It is hard to drop any ball, and I hate it! But they were plastic, and tomorrow it will be okay.

As much as I LOVE writing articles for the Tattler, this is a plastic ball that I've had to keep dropping because my life is more than a little chaotic at the moment! There's been a lot of up and downs with family, livestock, Room at the Table and life in general. I think, and I hope, that we'll hit a smooth patch soon. Can anybody explain?

We are, it is reported, using cash less and less. Personally, I rarely carry cash, these days, instead using a card for most transactions.

Of course, CoViD sped up the reduction of cash use. During lockdowns people turned more and more to online shopping. Even between and after lockdowns retailers stipulated "card only – no cash".

Where once I might have asked, "Do you take cards?" today I might ask, "Do you take cash?"

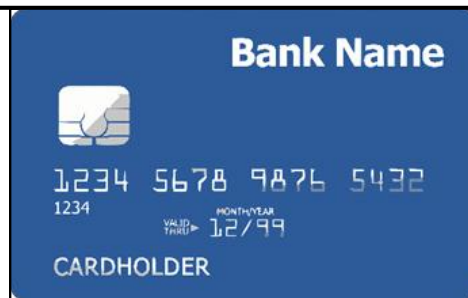
There is, very often, a transaction fee added to the purchase at point of sale. It isn't the retailers' fault. They are charged by the card companies and then pass it on to the purchaser.

Logically there must be a cost involved in processing these transactions. The charges are applied as a percentage of the purchase price, and therein lies my dilemma.

Let's suppose the charge is 1%. If I spend \$100, the charge is \$1. If I spend \$1000, the charge is \$10. The second is ten times the cost of the first. Does it take ten times more people or ten times as long to process because there is an extra zero involved?

To me, the cost of processing each transaction should be the same – both are only one transaction. Surely, a set transaction fee would be fairer?

Mooring Cemetery Trust News.

On Sunday 3rd of April, from 3.00pm the Mooring Cemetery Trust members invite the public to officially celebrate the new rotunda, mural, storyboards, and new lawn section at Mooring.

In 2019 the masterplan was completed. The brief was to develop a plan that addressed present and future needs of the cemetery. The plan has been the basis for all the works we have undertaken. This includes the new lawn area, which has the capacity for seventy-two burials and a rock garden to allow for plaques to be attached and ashes to be scattered.

The new section has been called The Mooring Cemetery Memorial Garden, in keeping with modern cemetery trends. The Cemetery receives no direct funding and relies on grants. We have been extremely fortunate in receiving grants from the State Government for the masterplan, roads, and rotunda: and the Benalla Rural City Council for the restoration of the front gates, the mural, and storyboards.

Landcare and private donations have been used to plant trees, including a memorial avenue.

The cost of "purchasing a plot" goes towards the long-term upkeep of the cemetery. There are no paid employees at the cemetery, only an enthusiastic band of volunteers who ensure that the cemetery is well maintained as a pleasant and reflective public space for visitors.

We will continue to implement aspects of the masterplan and are always interested in welcoming new volunteers.

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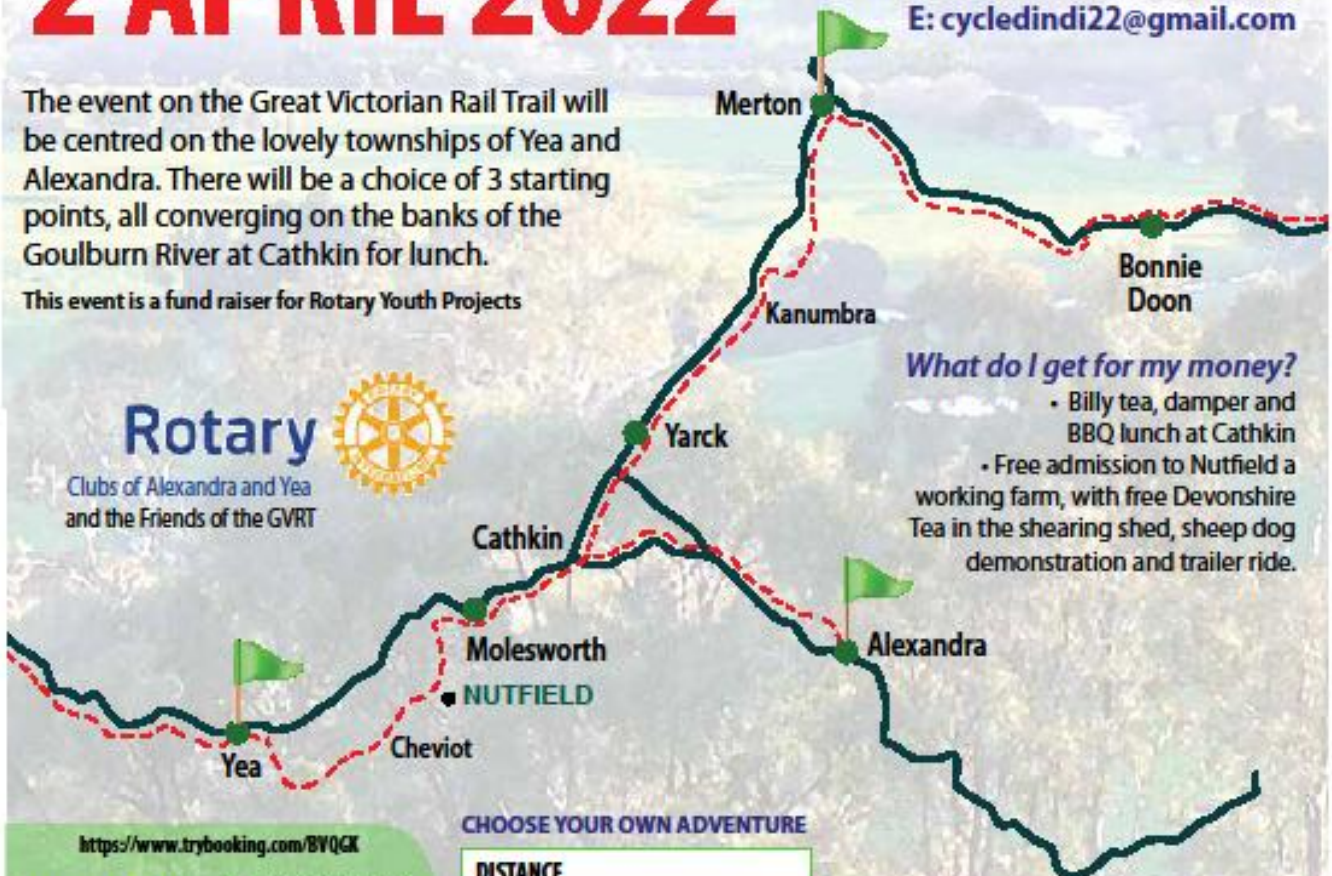
