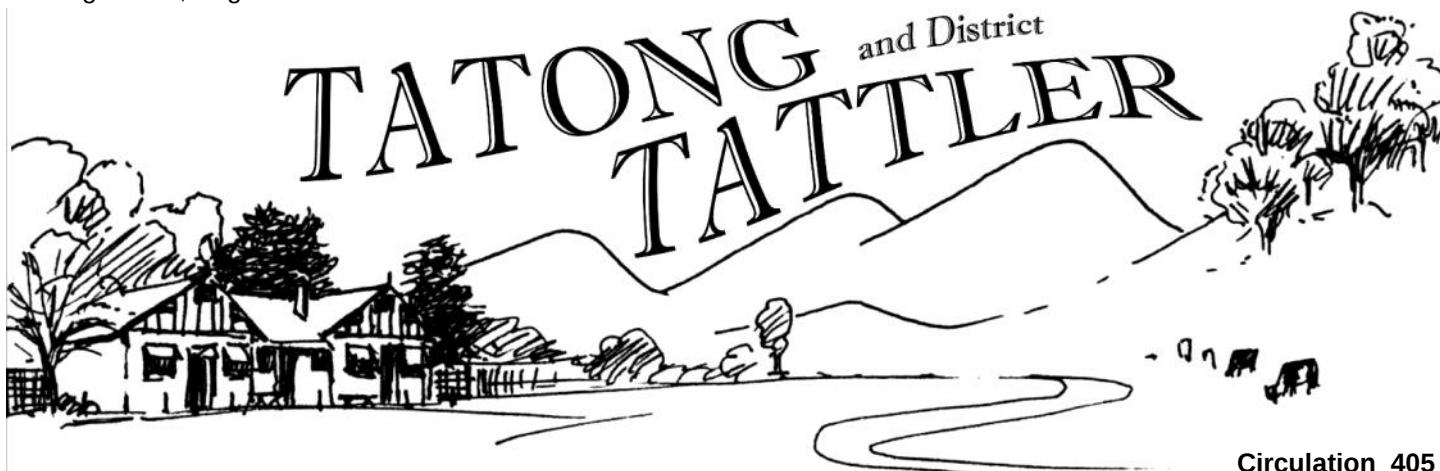




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Hello all,

Benalla Standard 3rd August 1926:

SHIRE OF BENALLA.

Benalla Standard 6th August 1926:

VICTORIAN RAILWAYS CHEAP EXCURSIONS.

TATONG LINE.—Friday. 20th August—To Melbourne from Tatong and stations to Karn. Tickets issued up to time of departure of train. Same date—From Melbourne to those stations. Booking closes noon, 19th August. Particulars at stations.

Benalla Standard 10th August 1926:

Council Minutes – Tatong Riding.

From J. Montgomery, quarry representative.. asking that the manager have about £15 in petty cash, so as he can pay any man off at a moment's notice, instead of the men having to travel to Benalla to receive their money after being dismissed.—This was agreed to.

The North Eastern Ensign 13th August 1926:

Municipal Elections. The municipal elections for the Benalla Shire Council will take place on - Thursday, 26th August.

The following members retire through the effluxion of time:

Cr R. Roe Central riding; Cr. J. Harrison, Mokoan riding. T. a'B Cook, Devenish riding; Cr. D. Dallas. Tatong riding; and F. A. Cook, Warrenbayne riding.

Nominations close on Monday next, at 1 p.m.

Benalla Standard 17th August 1926:

Shire Elections — Nominations for the Benalla Shire Council closed, yesterday, and the following were received:— Tatong Riding, Cr. Dallas; Mokoan Riding, Cr. J. Harrison; Devenish Riding, Cr. T. a'B. Cook; Warrenbayne Riding, Cr. F. A. Cook; Central Riding, Cr. R. Roe and Mr. T. S. Hanlon.

Consequently the town riding is the only one to provide a contest, the polling day for which will be the 26th inst.

Benalla Standard 17th August 1926: (abridged)

DUKE AND DUCHESS OF YORK - To be Invited to Benalla - PROPOSAL FOR JUBILEE SHOW.

At the monthly meeting of the Benalla Agricultural Society's council on Friday, Mr. Cowan made reference to the forthcoming visit of the Duke and Duchess of York to Australia, ostensibly for the purpose of opening the new Federal Parliament at Canberra, he thought that as an agricultural society, and representing the people of Benalla and the North-Eastern district, they should try to get the Duke and Duchess to visit these parts, and it might be wise for them to move in that direction straight away.

Mr. Cowan then moved that the society get in touch with both the Federal and State entertainment committees, together with members of Parliament, in order to get a visit to Benalla of the Duke and Duchess, and that in the event of this being arranged, that an autumn show be held. We could run special trains from Seymour, Albury, Tatong. Yarrawonga, Beechworth, Whitfield and Wahgunyah, which would carry the whole of the population. Fully 20,000 people would be present to meet the visitors.

The motion was agreed to unanimously. At the instance of Messrs Desailley, and N Cooper, Messrs Cowan, Cleary and Dr. Nish were, appointed a committee, with power to act to frame a letter of application for the visit, setting out the proposals and the advantages to be gained by such.

North Eastern Ensign 27th August 1926:

NOT LICENSED -Albert White, 17, of Tatong, was charged at the Benalla Courts on Tuesday last with driving a motor car in Bridge road Tatong, without being licensed. Constable Briggs gave evidence that he intercepted the defendant whilst driving a car on 28th July. Senior Constable Harnetty stated that he was only 17 years of age, and was not old enough to get a licence. Mr T. Williams, P.M. imposed a fine of £2, with 3/ costs in default.

Corowa Free Press 27th August 1926:

HOLIDAY ' EXCURSION FARES will be charged from Seymour, Yarrawonga, Beechworth, Bright, Yackandandah; Wahgunyah, Tatong, Cudgewa, and intervening stations by all trains on August 31, and by trains on September 1, timed to reach Albury by 2,10 p.m., and such tickets will be available for return till Friday, September 3 inclusive.

Weekly Times 28th August 1926:

The Attention Economy: Are We Scrolling Ourselves Smart—or Brain-Dead?

The other day, I was taking the train back home from Melbourne. I looked up and noticed a scene that's become so normal it's almost invisible: literally every single person around us, except me, was glued to their smartphone.

Right in front of me, a little girl was holding her phone up at an angle where I couldn't really help but see her screen. She was on TikTok, and it was dizzying (I did wonder, briefly, how she got round the social media ban). She'd look at a video for maybe two or three seconds, swipe, look for another two seconds, and swipe again. Watching her fly through content made me wonder: what is this constant bombardment doing to our attention spans?

I was chatting about this with my older daughter, who understands this digital landscape much better than I do. She told me that TikTok users can now have multiple windows open on their screens at the same time. Apparently, Netflix specifically greenlights and edits certain shows so people can watch them passively while scrolling through their phones – perhaps that's why their shows keep reminding you of the plot.

It took me back to the old arguments we used to have as a family—trying to watch a movie together while the kids' faces were buried in their screens. It begs the question: how are we supposed to actually learn, absorb new knowledge, or think deeply when platforms like Instagram and TikTok are constantly hitting us with rapid-fire stimuli?

We like to think our brains are built for this. We love the idea of parallel processing - the computer science term for doing multiple things at once. But neuroscience tells a different story. Sure, our brains can handle multiple *automatic* tasks simultaneously—like navigating a busy street while listening to music. But when it comes to focused attention, learning, or making decisions? The brain is strictly a serial processor. It has to work step-by-step.

To actually retain information and move it from our short-term working memory into our long-term memory, we need sustained focus. True creativity requires quiet, uninterrupted time. My old colleague, the academic Thomas Davenport, put it perfectly when he said that the sheer wealth of information on the internet actually creates a poverty of attention. We have all the data in the world, but none of the focus required to actually do anything meaningful with it. So, what's the damage? If our attention spans are shrinking, what does that mean for us practically?

- *We stop learning:* We lose the ability to engage with complex ideas, meaning we stop broadening our horizons and lose sight of what actually matters.
- *We stop reflecting:* Because we don't give ourselves time to pause and think, we get sucked into social media echo chambers that just validate our existing biases.

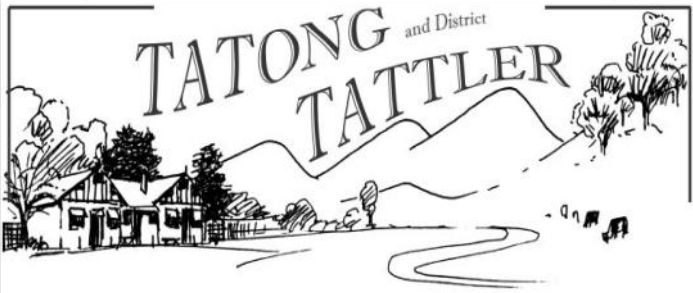
- *We lose real community:* We've all seen it—people sitting at dinner with friends or family, staring at their screens instead of talking to each other. Replacing physical community with a virtual one leads to isolation and stops us from interacting with people from different backgrounds, which is disastrous for healthy public debate.

We know less: It's a bizarre paradox. Despite living under a literal tsunami of human knowledge, we are at risk of becoming less and less genuinely knowledgeable.

This stream of images and data is only speeding up. Tech platforms are locked in a war to capture and monetise our "eyeballs", and they aren't going to slow down on their own.

So, next time you find yourself reaching for your phone during a quiet moment, it might be worth asking: are you choosing to look at the screen, or has the screen trained you to look?

HOT CRAB DIP

250g cream cheese
2 tablespoons sour cream
Lemon juice to taste
½ cup Parmesan cheese
¼ cup slivered almonds

Method: Use a fork to soften the cream cheese.

Stir in crab, sour cream, lemon juice, salt & pepper & half the parmesan cheese. Place in 2 cup casserole, top with remaining parmesan cheese & sprinkle with almonds. Bake at 180° for 15-18 minutes. Serve hot.

FARMHOUSE SOUP

60 g butter
1 pkt spaghetti sauce mix
1 onion
1 cup tomato puree
¼ teaspoon garlic salt
6 cups water
2 stalks celery
3 beef stock cubes
2 large carrots
1 cup macaroni
300g can red kidney beans
1 teaspoon oregano 3 tomatoes

Method: In a large saucepan, melt butter, add onions & cook 3 minutes. Add chopped celery & carrots. Cook 5 minutes. Stir in remaining ingredients, bring to the boil, stirring occasionally. Cook 20 minutes or until macaroni & vegetables are soft.

QUICK PASTRYLESS QUICHE

4-5 eggs, depending on size
1 pkt French onion soup
2 tablespoons wholemeal SR flour
1 cup milk (or ½ cup milk & ½ cup sour cream)
1 cup vegetables (zucchini, broccoli, carrots etc)

Method: Pre heat oven 180°. Grease a pie or quiche dish. Put all ingredients in bowl & mix until well combined. Pour into dish & cook for about 30-40 minutes. Test with a fork. Serves 4-6.

CORNISH PASTIES

Pastry mix
600g mince
2 onions
4 carrots
4 large potatoes
Pumpkin – same quantity as potatoes
Salt & pepper

Method: Chop onions & cook till soft. Add mince, cook then add shredded or minced vegetables. Cook until soft. Mix pastry. Roll & trim into circles. Fill with mixture, fold to form pastie. Prick to release steam & bake in moderate oven till brown & crispy.

NO-FAIL ONE BOWL PAVLOVA

2 egg whites
1½ cups caster sugar
4 tablespoons hot water
1 heaped teaspoon cornflour
1 teaspoon vinegar
1 teaspoon vanilla

Method: Put all ingredients in mixing bowl & beat with electric mixer for 15 minutes on medium. Butter pie dish & spread in mix. Raise sides slightly with spatula. Bake for 10 minutes at 180°C, then 45 minutes at 120°C. Leave in oven to cool.

Decorate with whipped cream & your desired topping. (berries, kiwi fruit, bananas etc)

ORANGE CAKE

½ cup sugar
2 eggs
2 oranges
2 cups SR flour
125g margarine or butter

Method: Cream butter & sugar, add eggs, one at a time. Beat well. Add juice of 1½ oranges & rind of 1

Mixed together. Gradually add flour. Bake at 180° for 50 minutes. When cool, ice with orange icing, using juice from remaining ½ orange.

LEMONADE SCONES

5 cups SR flour
300ml cream
1 can lemonade

Method: Mix together & roll out on floured board to 5cm thickness. Cut into rounds. Note – if you dip the cutter into 2 teaspoons flour & 1 teaspoon sugar, the mixture will cut more easily. Brush with milk. Cook at 230°C for about 20 minutes.

One thousand paper cranes



August 6th is the anniversary of the bombing of Hiroshima in 1945. The bomb killed over 100,000 people. Thousands more have since died of long term effects, particularly leukaemia.

Four years later, the Japanese government designated Hiroshima a City of Peace. A Peace Memorial Park was built on the site of the explosion's hypocentre and is a site of peace conferences to this day.

In ancient Japanese folklore, the folding of one thousand origami cranes (senbazuru) is a tradition. In Japan the crane is considered mystical or holy and paper cranes were offered to shrines and temples by those who sought blessings.



In the modern era, the tradition was revived and subsequently popularised by Sadako Sasaki, a child survivor of the atomic bombing.

Sadako was two years old when she was exposed to the radiation and she developed leukaemia. At the age of twelve, after spending a significant amount of time in hospital, she began making origami cranes. She believed a legend which said that folding one thousand cranes would grant her a wish. She would wish for world peace.

She folded 644 before she became too weak to fold any more.

She died on 25th October 1955.

To honour her memory, her classmates folded the remaining 356.



There is a Peace Bell in the Peace Park which has a statue of Sadako on the top.

All Japanese schoolchildren visit the Peace Park at some time during their schooling. Many of the school groups

bring strings of paper cranes...

Janette and I each folded a paper crane.

We rang the Peace Bell but perhaps it's time we all started folding?

Garden Daze

The best time to plant a tree is 20 years ago - the next best time is now



Time to start thinking about spring

planting - As we take out our seed collection an important question is:

How long will vegetable seeds remain viable?

The viability of seeds is dependant upon storage, with ideal storage conditions being "somewhere cool and dry". A closed jar or food storage box in the refrigerator is a good option, while the garden shed although handy to where they will be used, is not a good place to keep seeds as the conditions are too hot in the summer.

Check seeds for quality. Large seeds that are usually smooth and round (or plump), will not germinate well if they have become pocked or wrinkled. Peas, corn, and many other seeds are normally wrinkled but may not look as good as they should.

If in doubt - test for germination. Count out at least 20 seeds - spread onto damp paper toweling and roll them up so that the seeds stay separated, then place the roll into a plastic bag and keep it in a warm place. (around 25 degrees C). When some seeds have sprouted, and a one-week wait indicates that no more are about to emerge - divide the number of seeds germinated by the number of seeds tested to find out your germination percentage.

The table below is an indication of the viability of various seeds.

Perlite / Vermiculite What & Why?



Perlite and Vermiculite are similar but work in different ways. Both will - aerate the soil - retain moisture - impart nutrients.

Perlite is added to the soil of plants which need to dry out between watering, such as cacti or succulents.



Perlite is made from volcanic rock, which is heated and crushed until it explodes (like Popcorn - only a lot tougher) in order to transform the rock into small white pieces. Perlite has a neutral pH level, holds nutrients and three to four times its weight in water, is clean, sterile, odorless, and non-toxic. Works as a lightweight sand substitute. Won't rot or go mouldy.

The white granular pieces contain about 6 percent water, which will help lighten and loosen heavy, compacted garden soils.

Perlite helps insulate plant roots from extreme temperature fluctuations, is great for seed starting mixes and blending custom potting mix.

Vermiculite is best used for water-loving plants that need their soil to stay moist at all times.



Vermiculite is magnesium-aluminium-iron silicate, an all-natural mineral product, mined and processed into a soil additive which increases water and nutrient retention levels in soil.

Great for seed starting or blending your own custom potting soil mix. Helps to lighten and loosen heavy, compacted soil types, retain moisture and nutrients.

Mixes easily and well with soil and is clean, sterile, non-toxic, and odourless.

Vermiculite will retain more water for longer and hold more water in general than Perlite.
